

## LESSON #4: CLUE-STYLE TOSS-UPS (formerly Category and Word Game)

Clue-style toss-ups use a series of clues to lead to the specific type of answer, which is declared prior to the clues. All the answers should be related in some way other than simply how they are spelled, although that can be mentioned in the clues. **All of the clues must lead to all of the answers, and a uniquely identifying question must be used after the "For 10 points" rather than a generic "For 10 points, what are these words".**

Note that all clues lead to all of the answers, and that multiple clues are given. Also note in the first example that the number of answers has nothing to do with the number of parts to the question. Even though this toss-up has three answers, it is a "one-part" toss-up because it only asks one question.

I'm looking for three men. All three had leadership roles in Israel, and all three did some climbing. For 10 points, what three men went to the top of the hill while Joshua fought Amalek?

--MOSES [E 17:10]

--AARON [E 17:10]

--HUR [E 17:10]

Your answer will be a body part. This twice-used body part is found both times in the Passover Instructions. For 10 points, where would there be both a reminder and a symbol?

--FOREHEAD [E 13:9]

In these two-part examples, all of the clues still lead to all of the answers, but after "For 10 points" we ask two separate questions. Also note that the second example has four answers, but is still two-part because it asks two questions.

Two people will be your answer. These people are in the same immediate family. We are told where both of them were buried. For 10 points, who was buried in Kadesh; AND, who was buried in the valley in the land of Moab facing Beth-peor?

--MIRIAM [N 20:1]

--MOSES [D 34:5]

I'm looking for four people. All are found in Exodus and all are part of Moses' family. For 10 points, what two siblings of Moses are mentioned; AND, what two children of Moses are mentioned?

--AARON [E 4:14]

--MIRIAM [E 15:20]

--GERSHOM [E 18:3]

--ELIEZER [E 18:4]

**Note that you cannot ask three separate questions for three separate answers. We allowed this for several years, but these are functionally three-part toss-ups and we will no longer be asking them.**
